It is with excitement and anticipation that we enter into the focus of being a missional church – aligning ourselves with God's purposes in the world. At a time in the Christian church when much of the focus has been on personal renewal, the call now comes to us in a fresh way that personal reconciliation to God gives us a place and a task in becoming a part of God's redeeming work for all of God's creation.

Worship is at the foundation of this understanding. It is through our worship that we are called together as a people of God to affirm that God is God, to nurture within us the story of God's healing and hope through the breaking open of God's word, to joyfully offer our gifts and ourselves to the work of God's kingdom, and to move from worship as a *sent* people into our world.

Such a worship calls forth new energy, new vision, new language, new songs, and a strong affirmation of the foundations upon which we build. "No other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, Jesus Christ." (1 Cor. 3:11) Such worship calls for a renewed care for words – choosing the words which say who we are as a people of faith, and who God is. Such worship calls forth a creativity and unleashing of the arts to *bring forth* the message for a new time in the Post Modern age.

Enclosed within this packet are materials which *point the way*. Each piece can be used effectively in worship, but the intent is to illustrate something about a missional understanding in worship which is carefully crafted and designed to nurture and empower God's people. Meditate on these pieces, and let them transform your own language in worship, your prayers. Let them inspire new writing, drama, song, dance, visual art, that all point to a people engaged in God's purposes in the world.

May the Spirit move among us in ways far beyond what we could imagine!




Songs - If You Believe and I believe, & Mayenziwe Iona Community, Hymnal Subscription Service, 1998:2

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Morning Liturgy 1 Prayers of the Coming of the Kingdom

Taking the theme of the Lord's prayer, but shaping its language to speak with power and clarity, the church in prayer has vision, focus, and new understanding of its role in worship.

Take only the phrase, "Let us pray for the breaking in of God's kingdom in our world today," and use it as the beginning phrase of your congregational prayers for a month, a season, a year, and find its transforming power. Create your own prayers with the refrain, "Your kingdom come, your will be done."

Prayers for the Coming of the Kingdom

Let us pray for the breaking in of God's kingdom in our world today.
Lord, God
Because Jesus has taught us to trust you in all things, We hold to his word and share his plea:
Your Kingdom come, your will be done.
Where nations budget for war
While Christ says, "Put up your sword."
Your kingdom come, your will be done.
Where countries waste food and covet fashion
While Christ says, "I was hungryI was thirsty"
Your kingdom come, your will be done.
Where powerful governments claim their policies are
Heaven blessed,
While scripture proclaims that God has no favorites,
You kingdom come, your will be done.

Offering Prayers

The following prayers are taken from the Giving Project Resources for church renewal. It is through the offering time in worship that our priorities can be joyfully affirmed, God's work can be celebrated, and new vision which engages our resources can be called forth.

Use #1 With the following suggestion:

"As the prayer is spoken, you are invited to simply place your hands, palms up, in an open position of receiving and giving." #5 Use in a similar way. Have people tightly grip paper money or coins, and then open their hands to release it joyfully. #17 Theme 5: Joyful response to God's redeeming acts

Offering Prayers

#1

(Based on Psalm 104:28)

Dear God. You open your hands and we know your goodness You open your hands and the earth produces For us. You open your hands and another child is born Into the world. And God, you opened your hands and gave us The greatest gift of all, Your only Son who died so that we might live. And now, just as you open your hands to us, We now open our hands to you. Take these, our gifts to you. Take them and pass them on to any who lack Food, clothing, shelter... To any who need to know your goodnes... To any who have not accepted the gift of your Son. We give them with joy. We give them with thankful hearts, Our hands not holding tightly to what we keep. Amen.

#5

Joyful release

This money we once gripped in our hands is now In these plates (baskets, container, etc.) You released us from its grip on us. You freed us to give generously to your purposes. Grip our hearts to live the rest of our lives devoted To you, Just as we devoted these gifts to you. Amen.

#17

Joyful response to God's Redeeming acts

When: Anytime in the service

Introduction: Read John 1:1-5, 10-13 (As the text is read or recited dramatically, someone lights a candle in the front of the sancturary to highlight John 1:4.)

God created the world. Throughout history God seeks to redeem it through many saving acts. Today we respond to God's saving work in Jesus by giving ourselves to God through the offering.

(Receive the offering while a song about salvation is sung. Ushers bring the offering forward, then pick up individual candles, light them from the candle already lit, then hold their candles high.)

Dedication: Lord,

You have blessed us through the saving act of Jesus. We thank you that our life can be rekindled in him. The light came into the world, But the darkness will not understand it, Unless we respond by taking the light to the world. Amen.

(Ushers proceed slowly out of the sanctuary with candles lit and held high, symbolizing taking our light to the world.)

Closing Responses

The language is clear that God is acting, even when we are not! The reminder is there that Christ is present in everyone we meet. The call is for our engagement with the Spirit in God's active purposes in the world.
