Miriam Rudolph was born and raised in Paraguay, South America. In 2003 she moved to Winnipeg, Canada, to study Fine Arts at the University of Manitoba where she did a double major in painting and

printmaking. She graduated with a Bachelor in Fine Arts with Honours in 2007 and a Bachelor of Education in 2010. Miriam received several awards from the School of Art and several production grants from the Winnipeg Arts Council and the Manitoba Arts Council.

Since 2011 Miriam has lived in Minneapolis where she continues to make prints at the Highpoint Center for Printmaking. Most recently she has shown her work at the International Print Center New York, at the Highpoint Center for Printmaking - Minneapolis, Martha Street Studio - Winnipeg, in Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, and Washington D.C. She has an upcoming exhibition in Asunción, Paraguay, and her work will be shown in two international printmaking exhibitions in Alijó, Portugal.

Miriam's statement:

My prints are visual diaries that narrate my experiences and perceptions of living in Paraguay and Canada. It is important for me to experience my surroundings very

consciously, to be aware of details and to render the essence of a place in my artwork. Beneath the narrative of memories and perceptions lies the concept of my search for belonging that I experience after moving from Paraguay to Winnipeg. My work shows places that I feel connected to and serves to document, to evaluate, and to remember. I use a mapping method which has a lot of symbolic meaning for the search of belonging, because maps facilitate searching, way-finding, and revisiting.

While the prints about Winnipeg and the prairies have become an important element in my connection with the city and the land in making them my home, the prints about Paraguay illustrate all I don't want to forget and all I want to hold on to. Some of my work is more about the physical experience of a place, while the more autobiographical series is about my psychological and emotional experience of a place, exploring concepts of home and belonging, farewell and new beginnings, holding on and letting go.

Bennie's statement:

For this body of work, my objective was to make art that is both revealing and mysterious, but that also acts as a muse for the viewer, one that inspires memory, providing intellectual and visual stimulation.

I am exploring the everyday life of my family, home, place, and childhood. These are all memories I want to keep alive. My works not only reflect our lives as children growing up in a large hard-working family, but also move beyond the documentary to explore the fantastic elements of our everyday lives.

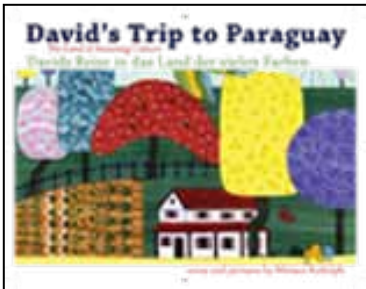
As an artist, I choose to use my skills of working in mixed media on drywall to create art that tells a story.

Then his family moved to the Chaco, Paraguay, to a different colony where he then developed an interest in an art career. At the age of 15 he joined a painting club and has created art ever since. In 2000 Bennie moved to Canada to study Fine Arts at the University of Manitoba. He graduated with a Bachelor in Fine Arts with Honours in 2012. He has exhibited in many group shows and solo shows in Canada and Paraguay.
