SHHH! WATER IS TALKING! A troubled love affair between humans, rivers, and lakes

SHHH! WATER IS TALKING! engages the damaging, mending, and delights of our rivers and lakes. In notes of celebration and lamentation, images and words bespeak our troubled love affair with the waters of the earth.

Water's speaking, in part through the fishes and trees, birds and animals (two-legged and four), is unfolded by a menagerie of artists. As well, their waterscapes, land-scapes and inscapes lead us into the diverse narratives proposed by the diversity of artists who make up this exhibit. In addition to the featured drawings of resident artist for the Talking Water Project, Bob Haverluck, seven other artists join in leading us to where waters run sweet or soured by calculation and indifference – paintings by Rhian Brynjolson and Patrick Dunford; photographs by Sam Baardman and Simone Allard; fabric art by Heidi Hunter and Joy Eidse; and drawings by Cullen Bingeman.

This exhibition is one part of a year-long Talking Water project that uses the varied arts to help engage the stories of waters mending as well as what makes for its being endangered. This is the third year-long project Bob has animated, using the arts to help engage issues of ecology. Bob was recently awarded the "McGeachy Senior Scholarship" to write, illustrate, and perform a series of "re-tellings" of biblical narratives that contain ecological firecrackers. Several events accompany this exhibit, all of them in the Gallery. These include:

- Sat, Nov. 30 (9:30 4): "SHHH! WATER IS TALK-ING THROUGH STORY, POETRY, AND THEATRE."
 The day begins with poetry, theatre, and story, and an overview of the situation with Manitoba's rivers, lakes and wetlands in the context of the Gallery's array of images. This will be followed by workshops on poetry (led by Dennis Cooley); story writing (led by Debbie Schnitzer and Sally Ito); and theatre sketch writing (led by Scott Douglas). The cost for the day is \$15 and includes workshops, pizza lunch, various coloured liquids and snacks. Workshops will be limited to twelve in number.
- Dec. 29: ALEXA DIRKS AND ARIEL POSEN IN CON-CERT and others either in the Gallery or nearby with reception to follow in the Gallery. (Details to follow, see Gallery website or website below).
- Jan. 11: SPIRITUALITY AND WATER (9:30-4:00), an all-day event at the Gallery with an eye to the justice and peacemaking dimensions of spirituality.
