Not a 33-year experiment - but ongoing - the Ascension didn't mean Christ left

The incarnation as ongoing - the inceptive aorist - "The word started to become flesh"

Christ was not Jesus' second name

Body of Christ is still with us - Eucharist and the Community

We ARE the Body of Christ - not replacement or mystical.
