

Faith, Sports and Leadership Resources









by Paul Born, Berrett-Koehler Publishers, 2014.



by Rachel Marie Stone, InterVarsity, 2013.



by Mary Clark Moschella, Pilgrim Press, 2008.



by <u>John Roberto</u>, et al., Lifelong Faith Publications, 2014.


Helps leaders learn what intergenerationality looks like in practice and how to design projects and initiatives to become more intentionally intergenerational.

by Jon M. Sweeney, Jericho Books, 2014.



by James Martin, HarperCollins, 2014.


James Martin, gifted storyteller, brings the Gospels to life and invites believers and seekers alike to experience Jesus through Scripture, prayer and travel.

by Michael Spencer, Doubleday Religious Publishing Group, 2010.



by <u>Duane C. S. Stoltzfus</u>, John Hopkins University Press, 2013.







The authors show how communities can recover and reconnect through the power of making music, creating metaphors, and telling their extraordinary stories of suffering and survival. They explore the concept of "social healing," a profoundly important intermediary step between active warfare and reconciliation.


