Local church youth in Burkina Faso helped build a welding workshop that will be a small business and a classroom to learn the trade.

## Service and Example

A new welding shop in Tin, Burkina Faso offers more than metal repairs to the local community. Norm Nicolson is using the shop to train youth in the trade of welding while modelling business ethics based on Christian values.

Norm, who is a Mennonite Church Canada worker with his wife, Lillian, led construction of the shop with the help of local church youth.

The Nicolsons note that many young men want to learn a trade to better support their families, but opportunities are rare. "A learning center like this will put Christian teaching into practice in ways that can go beyond simple preaching and evangelism," says Lillian.

Following Jesus is much more than a decision and a few discipleship classes. Lifelong teacher and preacher Palmer Becker has developed a 16 session discipleship program designed to make a life-long commitment to Christ a richer experience.

## Life Changing Practice

"Many churches simply offer 3 to 5 sessions of orientation for new believers or new members," says Palmer Becker. "That's not enough to prepare for a lifetime of commitment to Christ and the church."

In response Becker has written *Begin Anew: Christian Discipleship Seminars*. The 16-session booklet is designed to help seekers make life-changing commitments to Christ, to the church, to spiritual disciplines and to a ministry in the church or mission in the world. *Begin Anew* (98 pages) can be downloaded for free in English or Spanish at <a href="https://www.commonword.ca/go/89">www.commonword.ca/go/89</a>.

Growing mushrooms in coffee grounds is a new recipe for helping urban churches in Colombia strengthen their selfsustainability. Congregations who start small enterprises like this idea are taking root in Mennonite Church Canada's International Ministry's work in numerous countries.

### Church Mushrooms

Growing fungi in coffee grounds may help urban churches in Colombia grow in self-sustainability. Hippolyto Tshimanga, Mennonite Church Canada's Director of Africa Ministry and Latin America Ministry, is on a quest to bring economic sustainability to church communities. He's found that one of the best ways to do that is through small business endeavours that also provide economic support for families – like growing mushrooms

Pastor Rodrigo Preciado of La Mesa Mennonite Church attended a training session in Bogotá with an expert mushroom grower. This inspired him to initiate a mushroom growing project with La Mesa. Tshimanga reports that the La Mesa project is planting seeds for future church growth by including not only church members, but people in the wider community.

An Anabaptist/Mennonite peace church is growing in Macau, a Special Administrative Region of China economically driven by the gambling industry. Through cell groups, English classes, children's classes, and friendship evangelism, the Macau team invites working class people to join a community of people who follow Jesus.
