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## Stewardship Sunday, January 17, 2016

HWB - Hymnal Worship Book, SJ - Sing the Journey, SS - Sing the Story\*

#### Introduction

These worship resources are designed to assist you in planning worship for Stewardship Sunday. In uncertain economic times, it is difficult for us not to choose perspectives of scarcity and fear over abundance and generosity. In our congregations, many may be asking, "Can we afford to be generous?"

When we focus on stewardship in worship, we more easily remember that God owns everything and is generous beyond our imagination. In response, we can share with gratitude what we have been given to manage for God's purposes.

Our generosity is a response of trust in God's economy of abundance. Giving changes us because it can move us beyond our personal ability (can we afford it?) to an active confession of faith (all that we have and are come from God).

While designed to assist you in planning for worship on Stewardship Sunday on the third Sunday in January, these resources can be used any time during the church year.

## Theme: Risking Generosity





## Children's Story Possibilities

- Use the mustard seed image and "Wonder" idea from *Shine On: A Story Bible*, (MennoMedia, 2014) p. 226. When children pretend to become trees, as the Wonder idea suggests, comment about the strength of being trees together. If your group is of the right age and temperament, tell them about aspen trees and their root system. Then, try linking your feet together to simulate an aspen grove with a connected root system. Imagine how strong such a forest system must be and thank God for creating it.
- After each of these choices, imagine together what
  the world would be like if everyone shared and no one
  had to be hungry. Thank God for blessing us through
  God's amazing generosity, and ask God for help in
  being cheerful as we share what we have.

#### Sermon Starters

What happens in these parables? In the first, even though the sower only had access to marginal land marked by footpaths, gravel, and thorny weeds, the sower goes out to sow and the good soil yields a bumper crop. In the next, hiding a lamp would have been both foolish and a dangerous fire hazard but shared on a lamp stand for all it reveals everything. In the third, seeds or spores, that might have been impulsively or inadvertently scattered, yield a harvest with no human intervention. And finally, when a seed takes hold for an invasive plant that no one would intentionally plant in a garden, it provides shade and safety.

When we bring the theme of risking generosity alongside these parables, there are some rich insights:

- Though results cannot be guaranteed, giving can yield more than we imagined;
- Hoarding for ourselves is foolish and dangerous;
- Even inadvertent generosity can grow beyond our control;
- Acts of generosity, no matter how small, can take root and form a network that provides safe space for the vulnerable;
- In all, God's initiative and grace provide the outcome.

The imaginative possibilities of the last parable, that of an invasive root system, might not seem appealing but do offer an image of the kingdom of God coming near through the church as a biosphere of generosity (strengthening one another, providing space for risking, for the good of all). The Pando, the grove of quaking aspen in Utah, provides some great metaphorical connections (see <a href="http://www.atlasobscura.com/places/pando-the-trembling-giant">http://www.atlasobscura.com/places/pando-the-trembling-giant</a>).
