STORIES IN ART FROM IRAQI KURDISTAN

April 2 - May 14, 2016 Opening Saturday, April 2, 7:30 pm

In the last three years Iraqi Kurdistan (northern Iraq) with a usual population of 5 million has become host to 2.5 million refugees and displaced persons. This small geographical area is now home to several faith and cultural groups including Syrian and Syrian Kurdish refugees and Iraqi, Yazidi and Christian internally displaced persons (IDP).

Christian Peacemaker Teams Iraqi Kurdistan has had a presence in the region since 2006. CPT is an organization that had its roots in the peace churches of North America. Their mission is to "build partnerships to transform violence and oppression." In six regions of the world CPT stands with, accompanies and raises the voices of marginalized individuals and communities.



Kathy Moorhead Thiessen, a resident of Winnipeg who attends Hope Mennonite Church, has been

a member of the team in northern Irag since 2011. After Ray Dirks wrote to suggest an exhibition of art from ordinary people (not necessarily trained artists) from Iragi Kurdistan she began the search for people willing to share their story. The concept was a little difficult to convey as in that region exhibitions are not planned 10 months in advance. However, soon she found that works of art from Iraqi Kurds, Syrian Kurds, Yazidis, Assyrian Christians and Iraqi Arabs began to arrive at the CPT house. Through our work the CPT team has had contact with represen-

tatives of most of these groups. Kathy found people from the host Iraqi Kurdish community who depict life at the best times; in the farming villages and times of celebration. She discovered a group of Syrian Kurdish children and their art teacher who shared images of life before the conflict started. She found four Yazidi artists who portrayed the horror and grief of the last year and a half since they had to run from their homes onto the mountain of Sinjar.

Members of the Assyrian Catholic community shared pictures of the days when ISIS invaded the Christian city of Qaraguosh and


they had to flee for their lives. Kathy received pictures from ten young boys (age 10-13) who now have to work daily in the Sulaimani bazaar selling small items in order to support their families. They depicted what their life was like in Salahadeen in central Iraq before their families had to flee to the north to live in the tent camps. A young woman from Baghdad who had tried to find a better life in the Kurdish north created a painting on fabric of her city before the wars began.

Some of the artworks are quite primitive but with the artists' statements have a huge impact. We see pictures of places where there were few photographs taken and we are able to view the events right from the people who were there.
