Embracing Transitions

We face many transitions in our lives. Some of these are natural transitions such as the ageing process where we move from one stage of life to another without really noticing it. Some milestones such as birth, marriage and death are more memorable and more life altering than others.

Over the past 7 years that I have been volunteering with Mennonite Women Canada, I have noticed one major transition, namely the decline in the number of organized congregational women's groups in our Mennonite churches. As older women's groups are disbanding, younger women are not interested in connecting with each other in the same way as their foremothers did.

Traditionally Mennonite Women Canada (previously Canadian Women in Mission) received its funding through donations from women's groups (often in the form of "dues") which was channelled through the provincial Women in Mission organizations. Since 2007, three of these organizations have formally disbanded but still continue to connect with MW Canada through province-wide Retreats and/or Enrichment Days. Lack of volunteers to take on leadership

positions has meant a transition to a less formal organization.

MW Canada faced a challenge this past year when we were unable to fill our two elected leadership positions of President and Secretary-Treasurer. In February we were delighted to receive a positive response from Shirley Redekop to be our next President. In the past Shirley served on the MW Canada executive for 6 years as the WMCEC Coordinator. The installation will take place during our Annual Business Meeting on Thursday, July 7 at 10:30 am.

Our search for a Secretary-Treasurer continues. At our recent executive meetings on March 10 and 11, we decided to split this position and I have agreed to be the Treasurer for the next 2 years. So if you know of anyone who could fill the Secretary position please let us know. Details can be found on our website at http://women.mennonitechurch.ca/.

Mennonite Women Canada is in transition and we do not know what the end result will be. Transition to an alternative organizational model seems inevitable. The challenge for all of us is to find ways to accommodate these changes and still be a meaningful and vital partnering ministry of the church.

MCBC Women's Ministry

Since the folding of BC Women in Mission in 2007 and reinventing ourselves in 2008 under the umbrella of MCBC as MCBC Women's Ministry there is no longer as close a connection between women's groups and the larger organization.

With God's help, we will continue to show our love for Christ and for our sisters in Christ across Mennonite Church Canada and **know** that He will continue to bless us in whatever we choose to do in His Name.

"When all about you lies in pieces, may the Holy One make of them a passage," is a statement from Jan Richardson's book, *In the Sanctuary of Women*. When Manitoba Women in Mission made a decision to dissolve in 2009, women in Mennonite Church Manitoba were disconnected and broken in pieces but these pieces gave us something to work with, from which something new has developed.

This past year we have continued to give time to developing an organizational structure that will direct and define our mission. We have tentatively agreed to take our mandate from the MW Canada Mission Statements. Our work will be guided but not limited by these statements. One proposal is that we pay particular attention to the life/faith journey of women – it's seasons, challenges and possibilities. We want to listen to the experiences/voices/perspectives of Manitoba women and discern possible responses. These responses could include: support, advocacy, resourcing, networking, encouraging and prayer.

We are excited to be hosting a Sister Care Seminar on May 13 & 14, 2016 at Bethel Mennonite Church, Winnipeg.

Women in Mennonite churches in Manitoba continue to gather to sew blankets, assemble school and health kits for MCC; for Bible Study, often using the Annual Bible Study Guide; to provide meals and child care to families in need; to care for neighbours beyond our faith communities; to encourage, listen and be present with one another.

Many of Women of MCEC are still busy with quilting, comforter tying, Bible studies, retreats, special events, and

finding ways to connect with women within their congregations and their communities. Many are looking at ways to become more intergenerational.

WMCEC plans a yearly Spring Enrichment Day in April. In 2014 we also organized a bus trip to Ottawa where we were hosted by Ottawa Mennonite Women. We hosted a Sister Care Retreat with facilitators Rhoda Keener and Carolyn Heggen in October 2014. We held a second retreat in 2015 and have plans for two more in 2016.

My personal involvement in these events has been focused on sharing and hearing each other's stories. The theme for our Spring Enrichment Day in Markham is "This is my Story, This is my Song", hearing the stories of those who years ago, and more recently have chosen Canada as their new home.

In my home congregation, a highlight for me was conducting an interview with two of our matriarchs: Margaret Gingerich and Doris Jantzi. Both of these women, currently in their 80's, have influenced my life, as well as contributed in many ways to life of the church and the community.

Mennonite Women Alberta

Wherever Mennonite women find themselves in Alberta there is a willingness to connect. In past years most of the women's groups did similar projects such as serving food at all church functions and quilting. These were good times of visiting and worship. Today those groups have almost disappeared but women's need to connect has stayed the same.

Let me tell you what we do at my church Foothills Mennonite in Calgary. Every fall we have a 'Job Fair' where there is an opportunity to sign up for Bible studies, hiking and walking groups, serving at the Ronald McDonald House, food groups and yes, even quilting.

Twice a year all the women from our church are invited to attend a WISK (Women Intergenerational Seniors to Kids) event. Four women of various ages serve on this committee. This Easter we had a Palm Sunday Luncheon following the worship service. Forty plus women of all ages joined in the activity. We served soup, buns, and a simple dessert. A woman who has Ukrainian roots taught us how to decorate

eggs using waxes and special dyes. The young girls decorated sugar cookies and created Ukrainian flower wreaths. There was chatter and laughter around each table. Before dessert, while we were finishing the eggs, we listened to a short devotional that

encouraged us to always do our best and never give up. The woman who spoke is a hockey coach and she used her passion for hockey to demonstrate how God can do great things through each one of us.

This May long weekend all women from Alberta Mennonite churches are invited to a retreat at Sylvan Lake. This will be our fourth annual retreat and Carol Penner will be our guest speaker. The theme for the weekend is "re(making) our stories." A third of the women who attend are new Canadians and they bring a new excitement and enthusiasm. We are appreciative that Mennonite Church Alberta supports these women with subsidies if required for their registrations.

I look forward to seeing many of you there and I look forward to the journey ahead.


