## Reconciliation through the Arts

January 26 – March 10, 2018

**OPENING**, Friday, January 26, 7:30pm

"It is our hope that the exhibit will generate inter-cultural dialogue with Indigenous and Settler communities, to explore themes such as traditional life, treaty making, residential schools, protection of mother earth, returning to culture and spirit, 60's scoop, child welfare, incarceration, and the intergenerational effects from colonialism." exhibition organizers Clairissa Kelly and Marlene Gallagher

n spring 2016, we (Marlene Gallagher and Clairissa Kelly) brought students to view the STORIES IN ART FROM IRAQI KURDISTAN exhibit at the MHC Gallery. The exhibit was initiated by Ray Dirks and was brought together by Kathy Moorhead Thiessen of Christian Peacemaker Teams. Iraqi Kurdistan (northern Iraq) has been host to millions of refugees and displaced persons. All of these faith and cultural groups now live together in a very small geographical area. Christian Peacemaker Teams Iraqi Kurdistan asked representatives of several of these groups — Iraqi Kurds, Syrian Kurds, Yazidis, Assyrian Christians and Iraqi Arabs — to tell their story through art.

In viewing the art from everyday folks from across the globe, we could connect to the themes of oppression and thought that it would be great if we could showcase similar works from people

within our communities. In the era of reconciliation and in response to the calls to action outlined in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission final report, we approached Ray Dirks to see if there was an opportunity to create space within the gallery to showcase the works of Indigenous artists.

We put out a call for new and existing works from both emerging and established artists who identify as Indigenous (First Nation, Inuit, and Métis). We also asked for art to be submitted from the Settler community, as long as it fit within the broad theme of reconciliation. And, we led workshops in a number of settings in order to spur artistic creations for the exhibition. Clairissa Kelly, Marlene Gallagher





Historical background by Dr. Marlene Epp provides the base needed to better understand the situations which caused the Mennonite exodus and attempted escape from the former Soviet Union in the 1920s and 1940s. Ray Dirks writes about his own journey and the process involved in creating the exhibition.
