CHANGING WORLD a dialogue on conservation

Six artists, six different styles, one subject: Conservation. The artists in this exhibition work in very different ways to depict beauty, grief, the complex relationship between a medium and the world. Their works document the changes they are witnessing in a world of plants and animals they love. Each artist's work stands in dialogue with the others to create an exhibition that dialogues in turn with us, the viewers.

Joseph Koensgen is a Winnipeg artist with a passion for nature and wildlife. His keen interest in nature, combined with his artistic talent, meant that from a young age he was drawing and painting the animals he saw around him. Being self-taught, he has grown his talent into creating unique wildlife paintings that he hopes will connect people with the natural world. The underlying tone of his art is that of conservation, and a need to protect the beautiful and untouched parts of the earth. His hope is to start a dialogue about conservation through meaningful and creative pieces of art that show the beauty of nature and wildlife.



Chris Larsen, Fog

Being a Metis artist from rural Manitoba, **Chris Larsen** lives in the land of her ancestors, the birthplace of the Metis Nation.

What motivates her is the science of the natural world. With a deep connection to the land, she draws inspiration from the place where she lives beside the forest and the Boyne River. A visit to her River's Edge Studio inspires artists and nature lovers alike. It is a sanctuary where the voice of the forest and song of the river come together with evocative work driven by the ancestral search for meaning and belonging. Workshops and events are held here year round.

Chris has exhibited throughout the prairies of Canada and her work can be found internationally. She has helped develop a mentorship program for high school students in rural Manitoba to work with professional artists to gain credits. Chris has been awarded the Queen Elisabeth II Diamond Jubilee medal for her contribution to the arts.

Jodi Hildebrand produces brightly coloured and expressionistic work while also revealing subtle undertones of political and social commentary. These messages can at first be lost to a viewer who may be dazzled by the multitude

of colours and stylized subject matter, however, her work deals with ecological, feminist, and economic matters. Hildebrand obtained her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Manitoba in 2000. Her work tackles contemporary issues while expressing the wonder and complexity of living in relationship with other living beings.



For **Julia (Juls) Rempel** art is a means of giving voice to or grappling with issues. The subtitle for her submissions, "the Making of Ghosts," speaks to losses the world is experiencing due to the climate crisis. Using a combination of oil pastel, ink and etching, in this exhibit she explores the teardrop shape as a means of evoking memories of tears that speak to the sorrow underlying the effects of the climate crisis on our freshwater and oceans, and the life they support.

Ovid Charlette at 60 years of age is a long established, highly regarded painter. His work is obviously Indigenous and at the same time entirely his own. Relying on his knowledge of traditions and a willingness to be open and vulnerable, Ovid

probes deeply into his subject matter. His complex paintings are often layered with multiple meanings. There is always something to discover beyond the obvious in his precisely executed artworks. His interest in the ancient traditions of his people – searching for meaning, healing, looking to teach and to learn – and his ability to create thought-provoking, unique pieces makes Ovid a perfect fit for this exhibition.
