A Devotional During a Pandemic

I must admit that I don't know much about fishing, but over the years, I have gained some fishing tips while at the cottage with my brother-in-law:

- There are many different types of fishing fly fishing, ice fishing, freshwater fishing, saltwater fishing, shore fishing, rock fishing, canoe fishing.
- The equipment for fishing includes a fishing rod with line and a tackle box filled with hooks, lures, bobbers, sinkers, swivels, cutters and a container of worms or other live bait.
- The equipment used needs to match the kind of fishing you are doing.
- Fishing takes a lot of patience and waiting for that big one to bite.
- You can enjoy the experience regardless of how many fish you catch.
- A nice big fire and supplies to fillet the fish for the shore lunch!

With respect to Covid-19, we must "keep our lure in the water" by continuing to practice physical distancing, hand washing, etc. We are a few weeks in and for many, this is getting boring and tiresome, but it is critical that we exercise patience and wait for the public health officials to give us the "all clear." Remember to use the equipment and tools appropriate for the situation you are in but with this type of virus, it boils down to staying home, washing those hands and keeping them from your face!
