## Cross Lake, Manitoba – Celebrating the Church Family

Standing in front of the congregation of **Living Word Church** of Cross Lake, MB on Sunday evening, May 28, 2006, marked an exciting milestone in the life of Native Ministries of Mennonite Church Canada and the Cross Lake congregation. Neill and Edith von Gunten, Co-Directors of the Native Ministry program, were in the Cree community of northern Manitoba to present the congregation with the title to the land on which a church building sits. The completion of their newly-constructed church building and the congregation joining Mennonite Church Manitoba and Mennonite Church Canada in February 2006 were two additional milestones to celebrate.

The journey of the Cree and Mennonite peoples walking together began in the early 1940's with the relationships that helped to form the Mennonite Pioneer Mission (the forerunner of Mennonite Church Canada, Native Ministry). Since then, Jeremiah Ross and now Lorna McIvor, have been in the Lord across Canada. Their decision to become members of Mennonite Church Manitoba, and thus Mennonite Church Canada, demonstrates the strong, on-going relationship they have had with the Mennonite Church in these 50 plus years of relating to each other.

We celebrate the many years of faithful witness the local Christians have been to their community in spite of the social problems and upheaval around them, including the heavy social and emotional impact made by the flooding of their traditional land base for the large Jenpeg hydroelectric dam project in the 1970s. This small congregation has weathered many difficult times over the years, but it continues to reach out to its community and baptize new believers so that God's healing and hope will flow through them into the world.
