You are strongly encouraged to set aside a Sunday worship service to focus on God's mission at some point during the year. If you are unable to do this on November 12, please choose another date to emphasize your commitment to being a missional church.

Children's Time

Option A

Props: bathrobes, beach towels, fabric for draping, money, play money or food items, cloth bags to put money in.

Order widow's mites from Nazareth Village's gift shop: www.NazarethVillage.com. Use mites for the story, and then give each child two to take home following the story.

Divide the entire group in half, select two small groups, or select two children and a child or adult to play the part of Jesus for this option. Use money, play money or various food items to give to each person in the play. Slowly read Mark 12:38-44, helping children enact their parts as you or another person reads the Scripture. Encourage the scribes to show great pride, and indicate how great they are by giving part of their money (may use such props as bathrobes/beach towels, etc.). The widow/s could dress in simple robes or draped fabric, giving their money in a simple way, showing their trust in God. Discussion questions:

- 1. How can we give of ourselves, use our gifts for others, like the widow (woman) did in this Bible story?
- 2. I wonder how we can give and show God's love to our friends at church ... our sisters and brothers ... our parents ... our neighbors ... friends at school.

Option B

Read the book *The Giving Tree* by Shel Silverstein (available in most public libraries).

Discussion questions:

- 1. How can we give of ourselves, use our gifts for others, like the tree did?
- 2. I wonder how we can give and show God's love to our friends at church ... our sisters and brothers ... our parents ... our neighbors ... friends at school.
- 3. Let's listen to the Bible reading from the New Testament, Mark 12:38-44. In this story, the woman, a widow, gave all her money to help other persons and to show her love for Jesus.

Offering Prayer

Place a number of mission banks with offering baskets on a table, and have persons bring their offerings forward during singing or instrumental music. A world globe also may be used with the offering baskets/mission banks.

HWB 309, and read Hebrews 9:24-28

Sermon Starter

The Old Testament and Gospel readings for this day include references to marginalized people. The Hebrews passages focus on Jesus, the Great High Priest, who is our advocate before God and whose sacrifice secures our salvation.

The text from Mark invites us to confession and humble trust. Jesus warns his hearers not to be like the religious leaders, whose actions profane their piety. They abuse power to cheat widows out of property and then hide behind their practice of faith. Jesus warns about people who use religion to varnish their self-reliance and self-righteousness.

This story invites us to reflect on the temptation to use faith as a shield, hiding ungodly actions behind rituals of piety. The history of race relations in North America also can provide us with illustrations where the church participates in and/or benefits from abuse of power. The history of relationships with native peoples in North America includes a mixture of faithfulness and marginalization. Residential schools in Canada illustrate how the church's goal of evangelization was often co-opted to further a political agenda of assimilation. In the United States, relationships between African Americans, Hispanics and Caucasians also will provide illustrations of the church's failure to be faithful. Jesus points to a widow who gives a small amount of money to the temple treasury. This act of complete reliance on God illustrates pleasing piety. There is no public/status benefit here, only cost. Her action illustrates a complete dependence on God. Others give God leftovers, but this widow's contribution is a sacrifice.

How would our mission practices be affected by such a reliance on God's provision? Is it possible that we are in danger of relying on our own strength? Do our mission initiatives reflect reliance on God or on our own ability to strategize, plan and fund? Second, can we anticipate that God's presence is particularly evident in the margins of life? Are we listening to the marginalized for wisdom, instruction and call to accountability?

Prayer of Blessing

We are invited to trust completely in God's provision and grace. Go now with a humble heart, expecting God's surprising presence in the most unlikely places. Go in peace.

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
