Bread and Peace

Biblical texts: Psalm 85; John 6:1-15

Invocation/opening prayer

Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace, here are your children, the people who walked in darkness and have seen a great light (Isa.9).

We pray that you will guide our feet into the way of peace (Lk.1:79); of love for you and for our neighbor (Jn.9); and of righteousness and justice, the foundation of your throne (Ps.89:14). Give us this day our daily bread, and do not let us forget to share with others.

As we worship you this day, along with a worldwide host of the faithful, may the words of our lips and the thoughts of our hearts be glad unto you, oh Lord.

Amen.

Readings and comments on the Biblical text: John 6: 1-15

(The following may be used in place of a sermon)

Reading #1: John 6:1-5

Bread and solidarity.

Comment: A world where bread is shared begins with sensitivity towards humanity and the needs of our neighbors. Jesus noticed the hunger in the multitude and felt the same hunger. This is the meaning of compassion – 'to feel with.' Change in Colombia (Zimbabwe, Mexico, Indonesia, etc) will happen when others feel solidarity with people there in their hunger, their search, their need, their dreams and their anguish.

Reading #2: John 6:7

Bread and Financial Resources.

Comment: Philip responds to Jesus using the categories of market economy. When the motive of economy is hoarding by a few who become rich, the needs of all will hardly be met. But if the motivation for economy is to provide for the actual needs of people, we will find that there is richness and abundance for all.

Reading #3: John 6:8-9

Bread shared in Community.

Comment: The alternative to the economy of our days, which leaves millions suffering hunger and need, was started by a child. He offered what he had - the lunch box his mom that packed for him. If we share what we have for the well-being of others, we will create a community of joy and plenty.

Reading #4: John 6:10

Bread and Organization.

Comment: Goodwill is not enough. Jesus organized the people into groups. The multitude understood that if they put aside their individualism and egotistic attitudes

they could instantly change their situation. Organization and working together make it possible to achieve changes in our country so that there may be "Bread and Peace" for all.

Reading #5: John 6:11

Bread and Prayer.

Comment: Instead of complaining and asking so much from God, we should give thanks for all he gives us and share everything with love. When we sow the seed of community and sharing, God multiplies our efforts in astounding ways. The narrative does not explain where all that food came from: whether everybody shared what they had brought along or if the bread was multiplied. It is a fact that work backed with prayer achieves a lot.

Reading #6: John 6:12-13

Bread shared - abundance for everybody and even leftovers.

Comment: Today, when millions of our fellow citizens lack food, a roof over their heads, land, health care and education, let us realize that in Colombia as in many other countries, there are plenty of riches to fill the needs of everybody. If, instead of using one billion pesos for weapons and war, that money could be used for food and the well-being of our people, we could transform Colombia into a country of Bread and Peace for all.

Response:

- Time for verbal response and for sharing concerns and joys
- Prayers of intercession and thanksgiving (see attachments for additional prayer requests)
- Offering (for a church agency promoting peace and relief, MWC or other choice)

- We commit to build solidarity and to work for an alternative economy that promotes integral and sustainable human development.
- We commit to reject carrying weapons and to refuse to take part in military programs.
- We commit to dedicate our gifts, talents, skills, time, and resources to build a society of justice and peace by means of active non-violence.
