Worship Materials

Mennonite Church Canada Assembly Sunday - July 8, 2007

The themes for the six worship services that are being planned for the Mennonite Church Canada Assembly in Abbotsford, July 3-6, are the skeleton for this service. The hope is that your congregation will get a "reader's digest" experience of the assembly. It is expected that you may want to substitute music, draw on only some of the materials or rearrange them to fit the needs and resources of your congregation.

We encourage you to use these resources on "Assembly Sunday" – July 8, 2007 – or on another Sunday that is suitable, such as when your assembly delegates report back to your congregation.

The six themes are: **Built on Christ**

Built with Grace Built in Love

Built through Community

Built for Purpose Built to Last

We will be celebrating communion and commissioning of MC Canada elected volunteers in one of the final two services at the assembly. While that has not been included in this service, it is something you may want to consider for your service.

Special instructions are included in italics before each section in the service as required. Please note that the readers have been assigned as a consistent group throughout the service, but you may want to change them with each section depending on how many people you have to draw on that enjoy leading worship through word.

BUILT TO LAST Assembly Sunday

Note: HWB refers to "Hymnal: A Worship Book"

STJ refers to "Sing the Journey"

"Sing the Story" is a new hymnal supplement that will be launched at Abbotsford 2007 and that will be available from Mennonite Publishing Network after the assembly.

Prelude

This is a good time to introduce to your congregation some worship music that has been used at assembly but may be new to them. This may be a new song from a familiar resource, or from the new resource, "Sing the Story," which was launched at assembly.

Here are some suggestions:

Welcome

Welcome the congregation and guests to the service in the manner you are accustomed to and give a brief explanation about the tone and content of the service as a representation of the Mennonite Church Canada assembly in Abbotsford, July 3-6.

Prayer of Invocation

Lord, thank-you for gathering us together in your presence this morning, and for the gathering you have called us to from across Canada. Thank-you for going before us in our planning, for walking along side us in our worship and discernment, and for strengthening us from within in our sending. Be with us in our worship now, so we may hear your voice. In Christ's name, Amen.

Call to Worship

For the following reading, lines that are in italics are meant to be translated into other languages. They have not been translated for you, as we encourage you to use the languages that can come from your congregation. If you don't have at least four languages that can be represented other than English, try some accents or ethnic idioms, i.e., a Scottish brough or "Good-dai, mate". You can have fun with the diversity.

Reader 1 is the main worship leader for this service. This reading is also meant to be underscored with a hand drum or two if you have, like a djembe or conga drum. Start with the drums on a single beat in 4/4 time with the accent being on 1. Once the beat is established, add the reading on top, dropping the volume of the drums to keep a balance.

Reader 1: Listen! Can you hear?

It is the heartbeat of God, calling his children to Him. Calling them from the four corners of the earth.

(the drum beat can change to a heartbeat pattern, kathump, kathump...)

From the North

Reader 3: From the north (perhaps in German)

Reader 1: From the south

Reader 4: From the south (Spanish possibly)

Reader 1: From the west

Reader 5: From the west (An Asian translation would be good)

Reader 1: From the east

Reader 6: From the east (French seems appropriate)

AII: LISTEN!

Reader 1: It is God's love song calling us, His children, to gather together, Saying...

Reader 2: Come, draw near.

I want to hold you close to me.

So close that you can hear the beating of my heart.

All: Can you hear? Listen.

Reader 1: It is God calling to his people,

Now a clip could be shown from the movie "The Miracle Maker". It is a Russian puppet animation released in 1995. You can purchase it from www.crownvideo.com or borrow it from www. mennonitechurch.ca/resources. The film uses an interesting technique in mixing animation mediums. The 3D puppets are used in stop motion for the story, while 2D animation is used for Jesus to tell stories or to give voice to inner thoughts, dreams, or temptations of Christ. There is a scene near the beginning of the movie in 2D animation where Jesus tells the story of the wise and foolish builders. It's about 2-3 minutes long and is wonderfully done. If you have the media resources and licensing, this is wonderful to show.

For this children's time, have some of your church leaders, some new members of different ages, backgrounds and genders, and some church "founders" sitting in the front pew. What we are hoping for is a good representation of diversity of the body. Invite the children to face the congregation. You will want to tailor the questions to your congregation. I have listed suggestions. You do not need to use them all. Use some questions to amuse and relax, some to inform, some to cause reflection. Use themes of history, personal preference, faith. Be careful to stay away from questions or language that manipulate or shame. We want to inspire community. You may want to include some of the children in your church in asking the questions are even designing them. If so, be sure to do this ahead of time so you can keep it safe for all. Have fun!

Children's Worship

I thought we would conduct an experiment this morning on how well we really know the people in our church. I'm guessing all of us know somebody a little bit. Many of us know many people really well, but others not so much. Some of us know very little about most of us, and very few of us, if any, know each person here by name. And truth be told, all of us would probably secretly prefer not to know at least one other person here. Shh! Remember, it's a secret. And yet, we are the body of Christ and God wants us to be knit together at every joint. This has made me very curious. And wanting some support in this experiment, I thought I would invite some of the best curious minds that I know to help. Yes, that's you. Here's the plan. We will ask the congregation some questions. If anyone's answer to the question is yes, they are to stand up. We will take a quick photo of them of them with our photographic memory to record the data and then they can sit back down. Let's first of all take a family photo for posterity. Ready? Hold up your camera. To take the picture, push down with your finger and blink really hard. On the count of three, everyone say cheese and we'll take the picture. No intentionally silly faces, this goes in God's album. Ready, 1,2,3!

Ooops, there's always one in the crowd. Try again. Ready 1,2,3! Very nice.

You can answer the questions by standing up too, if your answer is yes. Pay special attention to the front row. I'm going to ask you to make some observations about them at the end to see what we have learned. A good experiment always requires some evaluation.

Let's start with an easy one just to make sure everything is working.

- 1) Did you wake up and make it to church this morning?
- 2) Were you born outside of Canada?
- 3) Can you speak 2 or more languages?
- 4) Is English your first language?
- 5) Do you have brown eyes?
- 6) Do you shave? Anything?
- 7) Can you do the splits?
- 8) Could you do the splits at one time?
- 9) Are you an early morning person by choice?
- 10) Is your favorite season winter?
- 11) Is your favorite season summer?
- 12) Do you have a birthday this month?
- 13) Is dessert your favorite part of the meal?
- 14) Do you have a food allergy?
- 15) Do you like individual sports like golf or tennis better than team sports?
- 16) Do you play a sport?
- 17) Do you prefer to watch sports?
- 18) Do you play an instrument?
- 19) Were you ever forced to take piano lessons against your will?
- 20) Do you participate in performing arts?
- 21) Do you participate in visual arts, like drawing, sculpting, painting?
- 22) Have you shared a meal with someone from this church in the last 3 months?
- Have you shared a meal with someone from your neighborhood, but not from this church in the last 3 months?
- 24) Do you prefer to sing tried and true traditional European hymns to new ones written in our time?
- 25) Do you like to sing hymns that come from other parts of the world?
- 26) Does having to learn new hymns make you a little uneasy?
- 27) Do you prefer faster hymns to slower ones?
- 28) Have you ever attended a Mennonite Church Canada assembly?
- 29) If not, would you like too?
- 30) Have you needed forgiveness this week?
- 31) Would you like to get to know at least one other person in this congregation better?
- 32) Are you ever afraid of speaking to someone you don't know yet?

So, what did you observe? What did some of the people in the front row have in common with each other? How did they differ? What did you have in common with some of the people in the front row? How did you differ from them?

God teaches us that we are all a part of the body of Christ, and we have to work together to keep it healthy and have it grow, but we don't have to be all the same. When we love each other, we don't need to be afraid of being different, just curious, because you never know what fun and friendship is waiting for you to say hello.

Let's pray.

God, thank-you for using your amazing, mysterious imagination when creating us – and then making us in your image, gifting us with an imagination of our own. Thank-you for creating us to have things in common with each other, so that we can know we belong, but different from each other, so that we keep being interested in each other and you. Give us courage to continue to use the blessing of your imagination to build relationships with you, each other and the world. Amen.
